

## **Doler (o-ue) and Indirect Object Pronouns (I.O.P.)**

Some verbs use indirect object pronouns, which we will call I.O.P.'s. What are I.O.P.'s in Spanish?

| Clarifier | Meaning       | I.O.P | Clarifier | Meaning              | I.O.P |
|-----------|---------------|-------|-----------|----------------------|-------|
|           | to me         |       |           | to us                |       |
|           | to you        |       |           | to all of you        |       |
|           | to you (form) |       |           | to all of you (form) |       |
|           | to him        |       |           | to them              |       |
|           | to her        |       |           | to them (fem)        |       |
|           | to Juan       |       |           | to Ana and Paco      |       |

### How it works:

1. When a verb uses an I.O.P the verb can only be conjugated in two ways: \_\_\_\_\_ & \_\_\_\_\_.
2. The I.O.P. always agrees with \_\_\_\_\_ hurts.
3. The verb always agrees with \_\_\_\_\_ hurts. Again, these can only be singular or plural!
4. Doler followed by a \_\_\_\_\_ noun use: \_\_\_\_\_.
5. Doler followed by a plural \_\_\_\_\_ or a \_\_\_\_\_ of nouns use: \_\_\_\_\_!

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To write these types of sentences we will follow this format:

1. \_\_\_\_\_ (A mí, A ti, A él, A nosotros...)
2. \_\_\_\_\_ (me, te, le, nos, os, les)
3. \_\_\_\_\_ (duele - duelen)
4. \_\_\_\_\_ (la cabeza, los oídos)

### **Examples:**

My head hurts.

\_\_\_\_\_



(My head hurts (me).)

1. Your ears hurt (you).
2. Paco's throat hurts (him).
3. All of your stomach's hurt (you).
4. Our feet hurt (us).
5. Their legs hurt (them).
